**Chief Roy E. Mosley III, CLEE  
Assessor**

Chief Roy E. Mosley III is a 29-year veteran of Ohio law enforcement, and has served as the Chief of Police for the Brimfield Ohio Police Department since 2015. Prior to his current role, Chief Mosley served with the City of Streetsboro Ohio Police Department from 1993-2015, where he was promoted through the ranks of the agency as a Sergeant, Lieutenant (second-in-command), and finally as the Chief of Police, where he served in that role from 2011-2015. As Lieutenant, Chief Mosley was instrumental in developing the School Resource Officer Program in partnership with the local school system, and implementing a new K-9 Program for the Streetsboro Police Department. Prior to accepting his current position, Chief Mosley also worked in the private sector serving as a public entity Risk Control Consultant for a large insurance carrier.

Chief Mosley is an active member of the Ohio Association of Chiefs of Police, the International Association of Chiefs of Police, and the FBI National Academy Associates. On behalf of the Ohio Association of Chiefs of Police, Chief Mosley has served on the OACP Education Committee since 2008 and was appointed Committee Chairman in 2021. He has also served on the CLEE Executive Board since 2015. Chief Mosley was appointed as a Police Management Consultant for the OACP in 2018.

Chief Mosley earned a Bachelor of Science degree from the University of Akron in Political Science/Criminal Justice. He is a graduate of the Ohio Police Executive Leadership College (PELC) and the Certified Law Enforcement Executive Program (CLEE), Session XII. He is also a graduate of the FBI National Academy, Session #222, and has completed additional leadership training through the International Association of Chiefs of Police and the Southern Police Institute.
